





STATEMETT

On Abril 5, 1944, I was flying as observer in the Denuty Ship, right wing of Captain Stone, at 1439. I saw his ship swerve slightly as it received a warst of flak on its left wing, approximately I whinte prior to releasing its bomes. The ship continued on course under control, dropping its owns on the target at the right moment. Inactiately following the release of bomes, two men baled out through the mose wheel door as the ship began to lose altitude, still under control. A few seconds later, 3 more non baled out through the front bome bags. I followed the ship as it continued down, still well under no strol. I last saw it at about 12,000 feet, under control. A large gabing hole could be seen in the wing, between engine nacelles So. 1 and 2.

STATEMENT

I was pilot flying right wing, or deputy lead of the group which Captain Stone was leading. We were on the bomb run for approximately three and one-half minutes when Captain Stone's plane dropped below the two wing planes. Thinking this was evasive action, I followed as best I could and when we were figain in position, I sensed that Captain Stone's ship was hit by flak as there were several bursts near us. Approximately 50 seconds later he dropped his bombs and immediately after release of his bombs, the plane swerved to the right and started down in a slow gradual descent. As the plane left the formation, two men came out of the nose wheel door, and at various times during the descent of the ship, men were noted coming out of the bomb bay and waist windows. In the wake of the plane eight parachutes were observed. I believe the plane was hit by flak in a vital spot and unable to continue the homeward flight.

STATEMENT

I was navigator flying Number 3 position in the lead flight. We were on the bomb run with bomb bay doors open, and at 1439, I observed Captain Stone's bombs being released. About the same instant I caw his ship swerve to the left and dive. Shortly afterwards the ship righted itself and I observed one man coming out the bomb bay door. A large hole could be seen in the leading edge of the left wing about one-third of the way between #1 engine and the tip of the wing. When last seen the ship was apparently under control.
